

# GCSE Construction and the Built Environment Specification Addendum

## Exceptional Assessment Adaptations (for 2020–2021)

<b>Unit 1: Introduction to the Built Environment</b>	External written examination  <b>1 hour</b>	20%	This unit will be <b>eligible</b> for omission for candidates cashing in for the qualification level grade in Summer 2021.  This unit will still be available for any candidates wishing to be assessed in all units.
<b>Unit 2: Sustainable Construction</b>	External written examination  <b>1 hour 30 mins</b>  The paper includes questions based on pre-release materials.	30%	No changes.
<b>Unit 3: The Construction Craft</b>	Controlled assessment  We visit centres to moderate the results.	25%	Permit teacher demonstration of manufacture of one of the products. Students do not manufacture a final product or make a mock-up or model. Their detailed designs will be accepted in lieu of a final product.

<b>Unit 4: Computer Aided Design in Construction</b>	Controlled assessment  Teachers mark the task and we moderate the results.	25%	No changes.

For those students who started their GCSE course in September 2019 and are due to cash in the full GCSE in Summer 2021 should they choose to sit all units of the GCSE, they will receive the higher of either:

- the grade awarded on the basis of the outcome of the required units specified by CCEA; or
- the grade awarded on the basis of the outcome of the full set of units for that qualification.

In both cases the full specification content should still be delivered.

For candidates commencing their GCSE course in September 2020, it is recommended that, as far as possible, the units are delivered in numerical order in case of any further disruption to the academic year.
